WASH DAY IN CALIFORNIA

Funny how things change over the years, Monday used to be wash day, now is any day and is referred to as laundry. Most of you reading this cannot relate to what it was like many years ago in California for wash day. Anyone in airplanes and could look down would see nothing but clothing hanging on lines in yards, not always on Monday but just whenever the weather permitted it. Winter and rainy days were the worst. If you did not have a basement clothing was hung around the house and in some places hanging in the kitchen to dry. Needless to say what it was like with the smog in the air from all the coal stoves as most had at least or maybe two heatrolls the necessary way of staying warm in the winter. Down home at 5844 Panama St. we had a little wash house (since gone) where you could do the wash outdoors in warmer months. We had a copper boiler that was placed over a little fire to heat the wash water. (I still have ours). After heating the water more water was added and the whites were boiled to get them whiter. The whole entire day was used

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WASH DAY IN CALIFORNIA

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in doing the wash. Can you imagine nowadays waiting a week or longer to do the laundry? Most clothing is not given the chance to be soiled before it is tossed in the machine and washed again. On the real soiled clothes we used the old wash board with a brush and actually rub the dirt out. For detergent, no prepared box or bottles. We had a bar of WERK (might be wrong spelling) soap, with naphtha in it, and had a little metal tab in it that you saved for some incentive, it was also referred to as TAG soap. This was grated into the washing machine, didn't make much suds, but must have done the job. You started with your delicates, then your whites and colors and dirtiest last all in the same water. The portable tubs were filled with rinse water, with something called bluing which was added also for whiter clothes. Then a big pot of water was put on to boil and starch was made for the starched items to be dunked into, made them stiff as boards. Lines were stretched all over the yard and filled, taken down when dry, and then more hung so made it an all day job. If you did not have an old cistern not in use you could carry the used water and dump it in there otherwise you had to get ride of the water the best way you could.

Remember we had no sewers. Thus no plumbing. If you lived in a multiple dwelling you had to check with others to see when they were going to do their wash so you could have access to the yard and lines. When Charles and I moved into the apartment at 6012 Kellogg Ave. when Chuck was a baby there were 4 apts. in the big building so we took turns using the hanging space. You took pride on having a nice looking white wash, you didn't want to be known as having a dingy drab wash hanging for people to look at. I was referred to by some as MISS WHITE WASH, QUITE AN HONOR? Can you imagine the exercise you would get running up and down to the second floor to carry and process the wash on the lines. To this day I do believe that Mariam Clark and I are the only ones that still hang our wash outside. Of course, it is not a problem anymore since we all have automatic washing machines. When I first got my modern washing machine I worried myself sick thinking of the all the water that was wasted coming and going out. I thought the water would run out and we wouldn't have anymore.

Soon after living on Kellogg we moved to where we are now and things were worse. Back to heating all your water, carrying your waste water outdoors and no place to hang the clothes but outside. Many times they became frozen on the line and you had to carry them in in stiff sheets and let to thaw out. One time the river came up and I had to get the wash down off the line and was not too far from the bottom of the clothes and I had to use hip boots to do it.

Wow, what a life it is now. I do have a drier in case things are bad, so no problem. I did find out that clothes last much longer by being hung out to dry compared to being in driers. Driers seem to wear them out but are a lot softer. You think housework is rough nowadays, try the old fashion way.

March 9, 2010 7:30 P.M.

Call to Order:

The meeting opened with The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag led by President David Ross. Roll call of officers found Secretary Diane Havey, Treasurer Kathy Chandler and Jackie Frazier were absent.

Minutes:

January meeting minutes were published in the February / March 2010 newsletter. A motion was made to approve by Jo Shepherd, seconded by Hilda Davenport. There were no meeting minutes for February due to the snow storm cancellation of that meeting.

Treasurer's Report:

There was no Treasurer's Report. David Ross did indicate that there were no expenses or deposits except for expenses for last newsletter. He also indicated that we were still waiting on payment from the city for our last invoice for nsp 2009 sent early January. The city is still having problems running these programs smoothly since taking over administration of nsp and nbd from Invest in Neighborhoods.

Police Report:

Police Officer Germaine Love and Kelly MacBeth gave the police report. Also present was Captain Doug Weisman. California only had 1 crime in February, Jack Carnes shed was broken into. The incident dealing with the Meth Lab is not technically a City of Cincinnati report, they are assisting the Blue Ash Police Department where the incident originated, which led then to California. Discussed that this is the time of year where more strangers are present in the community due to softball, boating, etc., so keep an eye out for unusual behavior. Also beware of scam artists who pose as repair / handymen looking for work and actually are looking to see if someone is not home, then they will break in. On May 29th there will be a biathlon occurring at Coney Island and along Kellogg Avenue. What for bikes along Kellogg. There was mention of 4 wheel vehicles riding off-road under the 275 overpass. Fire report:

Several members Cincinnati Fire Department Ladder 18 were present and gave a fire report. In the month of February, 7 fire runs and 47 EMS runs were recorded out of the Lunken Airport Station. These were total runs and not just to California, they did not have those numbers. Remember to change batteries in your smoke detectors. Question was raised about legality of outdoor fire in contained fire pits. They respond to complaints so as long as smoke is controlled to the point that it does not bother a neighbor, there should be no issue.

Old Business:

As of this date, the city and Invest in Neighborhoods have not come to terms with who will be administering nsp and nbd programs this year, in the meantime there is no review process occurring so no money is flowing. Due to this it was decided to go ahead and publish the February / March 2010 newsletter at our expense. We may or may not have resolution in time for the April / May 2010 issue. Consensus was to print the April / May issue and pay Jo Shepherd for her duties as Editor out of CCC funds if nsp / nbd are not approved in time.

New Business:

David Ross will prepare and print 50 copies of a flyer to advertise for the Easter Egg Hunt.

CCC President David Ross asked about interest in participating the Great American Cleanup or do one of our own. Consensus was to be a part of the GAC on April 24th. David will sign California up.

There was discussion about getting our landscape maintenance contractor to vacuum or blow the sand and debris off and possible pressure wash the Kellogg Avenue Streetscape walks. Also try to do a better job of emptying cans. Depending on available funds this year, we may have to do some with volunteers.

With no further business before the council, Hilda Davenport made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Bess Carnes, motion passed. Meeting Adjourned.
